Educating the Future A brief history of Lucy Craft Laney compiled by Jennifer Dawson

Lucy Craft Laney was an educator and activist whose work incorporated community service with academic achievement.

Ms. Laney was born 11 years before slavery was abolished on April 13, 1853, in Macon, Georgia. Her father, David Laney, was a Presbyterian minister who had saved enough money to buy his freedom. He also bought her mother's freedom.

One argument given by enslavers for the continuance of the practice was that African Americans were inherently less intelligent than whites. Despite that argument, legislators found it necessary to make it illegal in Georgia for black people to learn to at the time of Ms. Laney's birth. It is interesting to note that it was the sister of her parents' enslaver who taught her to read and write by age four.

By the age of 12, she was translating Latin. She graduated from high school and was in the first class of Atlanta University. She graduated with her teaching credentials.

After teaching for ten years, she opened her school in Augusta, the first in the city for African American children. It was housed in the basement of Christ Presbyterian Church. The school grew rapidly from six to over 200 children in the second year. There were no facilities large enough to serve the growing school.

She petitioned the Northern Presbyterian General Assembly for funds to expand the school but there was no money available, according to one source. She did win a benefactor, Mrs. F. E. H. Haines who provided her with startup funds. In time, the Presbyterian Board of National Missions supported the school.

Ms. Laney's school was named The Haines Normal and Industrial Institute in honor of Mrs. Haines and grew to cover a city block. In 1928, the school had more than 800 students. It had the first kindergarten for African American children as well as a nursing school. She served as

the principal.

She also helped found the local chapter of the NAACP, worked to integrate the YMCA and YWCA, and worked with the National Association of Colored Women.

She died on October 24, 1933.

In 1974, then Governor Jimmy Carter hung her portrait along with the Rev. Henry McNeal Turner and the Rev. Martin Luther King, Jr in the Georgia state capitol. These were the first portraits of African Americans to grace the capitol.

Vital Congregation Initiative First Quarter Cohort Gathering

I am writing this on a February day that is predicted to hit 60 degrees. I am itching to get outside and clear away the leaves covering my newest garden plot. I want to till it up again so I can smell the rich soil. It will be a Hosta garden adjacent to my new beehive. I can almost see the bees buzzing among the flowers and the honey waiting in the hive.

But it isn't time yet for all of that. If I give into the call of the dirt, I will disturb the pollinators I'm trying to help. If I rush to plant, the next cold snap will destroy my work.

There are seasons around which our lives are ordered. There is a time to reap and a time to sow the preacher tells us in Ecclesiastes. So, I will wait. I will use the time before planting to clear some of the vines that have covered my little patch of land in the time that it was untended. I will go to bee keeping classes and learn the mysteries of the honeybee. I will gaze longingly at the seed catalogues, charting out just what new bed to put in next.

Chris did a great job outlining the coming year for VCI. This first quarter is a time of coming together. It is a time of study. We met for the first quarter cohort zoom meeting a few weeks ago. It was a good time of conversation and orientation. The next item on our calendar is the Seven Marks bible study. I am excited about this.

I have been working with our Mission and Nurture committee to set up a presbytery wide zoom study during Lent. We will begin on March 1st at 7 pm. This time together will be both large group and small group study. It would be ideal for your VCI congregation to join in as a group. The meeting will start with a large group overview. We will then break off into our

congregational groups. If you are a lone ranger, don't worry. We will set up a room for those who are joining us on their own to have conversation about these marks.

There will be time for digging into the dirt of our vitality. In the summer, we will begin our assessment phase. This is where we will get to check the health of our soil, see what marks we excel in and which marks we need to nurture. We will harvest in the fall with our time of celebration.

Let us not rush into this work. Let us take the time for the pollinators to go through their transformations as we dive deeply into our study of how these marks of vitality draw us into closer relationship with Jesus and one another. When we find ourselves in one of these beautiful days in the middle of winter, let us rejoice in the warmth of the sun on our faces. The winter will end. The hope of spring is at hand. The hope we have in Christ is that God has destroyed forever the power of sin and death. We are raised to new life in Christ, vital and sweet as honey.
